family's dairy farm. "I've been helping out on the farm since I was born, I think," Cory stated smiling. A typical day for Cory would not be typical for most students of Markoma. His day begins shortly after 5 a.m. with bottle feeding calves, grain feeding the other animals or helping with the actual milking process

depending on the day of the week. "On the weekends, I do more since I don't have to be at school". Cory commented, "I usually grab a snack as I go out but wait for breakfast until the chores are done". After a full day of school, many of the chores are repeated for the evening milking, then comes family time and homework before bed. Cory notes that dairy farming is 7 days a week, 52 weeks a year. "You don't get days off and sometimes you have to work when you're sick. The cows won't wait!" While he is a very busy young man, Cory still finds time to watch sports on TV and enjoys playing ping-pong, foosball and video games. "I also like to listen to music, " Cory said, "but I only listen to good music." After graduation, Cory's plans are to keep up the family business.

Jenny Lynn Myers...

... the daughter of Monte and Brenda Myers of Tahlequah, has attended Markoma since her 8th grade year. An athletic 17-year-old, sports have played a major role in Jenny's life at Markoma.
