- 6. <u>Catalog Description</u>: In-depth, hands-on training using the image editing software package Adobe Photoshop. This course will cover all the major professional uses of Photoshop, including making and using selections and layers, masking, brushes, using and creating type, color manipulation and correction, collaging multiple images, and the preparation of image files for multiple uses such as print and web design.
- 7. <u>Course Purpose / Goals:</u> This course provides a comprehensive experience in the basic concepts, problem-solving situations, and design formats typically associated with the creation of illustrations for print and digital publications. The class is intended to generate a portfolio-level effort in the quality of concept, design, and presentation. Final projects should represent the student's best effort in presenting polished, professional-looking work. Students will be provided with basic information to begin an investigation and ultimately develop and execute their project in a professional quality product.
- **8. Student Learning Outcomes:** In order to develop your skills in graphic design, you will be expected to achieve the following objectives:
 - Know how to navigate the Photoshop interface with basic keyboard shortcuts.
 - Identify the functions and apply the use of the standard tools.
 - Apply the masking techniques.
 - Apply knowledge of layers to execute a montage.
 - Apply knowledge creatively to adjustments features to alter and repair imagery.
 - Gain the skill of creating type.
 - Execute a multi-layered project, given specific parameters of size, mode, format, and resolution.
 - Conceptualize the creation of digital imagery through manipulation and coloring techniques.

9. Instructional Methods / Strategies:

The main instructional strategy is the introduction of exercises that will require the student to develop skills in operating the software and creating visual solutions.

Additional instructional methods include, but are not limited to, the following: lectures, group discussion, display examples, guest lectures, and general instructional comments during working sessions.

Course assignments, documents, notes and materials will be posted on Blackboard. Students should check Blackboard often to download relevant materials, and print documents for class.

Students are also required to keep their Blackboard contact information updated as class communication will occur through blackboard
