Individual work fitted to the special needs of student. NOTE: Any combination of courses in this series may be repeated for credit with different topics.

**Course Purpose / Goals:** Course will introduce students into the world of photography beyond just taking snapshots. Through assignments designed to help them develop the "eye" of a photographer, students will learn various principles of composition that will enhance their photographic skills. Students will gain experience through hands-on assignments, lectures, demonstrations and the critique and evaluation of their photographs. They will study camera operation, basic theory of materials and processes, exposure, and presentation skills.

#### Student Learning Outcomes: students will develop skill in photography through...

- Understanding the history of photography and how it affects photography today.
- Gaining an understanding of digital cameras and become proficient in their use.
- Development of skills of good photographic composition.

#### Instructional Methods / Strategies: No Textbook Required.

- Each student is to have a digital camera with sufficient control over exposure (i.e., lens openings, shutter speed, focusing, and light metering) to complete the assignments.
- Each student is responsible for their own digital media (SD cards, etc).
- The main instructional strategy is the introduction of exercises that will require the student to develop skills in operating the software and creating visual solutions.
- Additional instructional methods include, but are not limited to, the following: lectures, group discussion, display examples, guest lectures, and general instructional comments during working sessions.
- Course assignments, documents, notes and materials will be posted on Blackboard. Students should check Blackboard often to download relevant materials, and print documents for class.
- Students are also required to keep their Blackboard contact information updated as class communication will occur through blackboard
- Students required to use Dropbox.com for uploading of assignments.

#### Student Performance Activities:

- Regular attendance for the full class period is mandatory.
- Absences on key dates such as quizzes or assignment hand-in days will severely affect your grade.
- You are allowed three unexcused absences during the semester. Excessive absences will result in a grade reduction.
- New assignments, presentations or demonstrations will not be repeated.
- There will be no make-ups for missed critique presentations or quizzes.
- Tardies are distracting; also, some critiques are given at the first of the class period, so make every effort to be in class on time.

### Learning Outcome Assessment Methods:

- Due dates will be given on all assignments and must be met for full credit potential.
- Work is graded by total points averaged against a 100 point scale as follows:
- Points for projects are awarded as follows: 100-90=A | 89-80=B | 79-70=C | 69-60=D | below 60=F
- All grades will be averaged to arrive at your final grade.

- Lens types / focus / depth of field / exposure compensation
- Understanding Composition: Seeing like the Camera
- Historical aspects
- More techniques to improve photography
